

# Getting Started on FASENRA



## ● Why is FASENRA part of my treatment plan?

Your doctor has determined that FASENRA may be right for you. FASENRA is an add-on treatment for people 12 and older with severe eosinophilic asthma. It is not a rescue medication or for other eosinophilic conditions.

When added to your current treatment, FASENRA has been proven to help:



prevent asthma attacks



improve breathing



lower daily oral steroid use

Results may vary. FASENRA does not replace your other asthma medications. Do not stop taking your current treatments unless your doctor tells you to.

## ● How much does FASENRA cost?

Your doctor's office should work with AstraZeneca to check your insurance coverage. It may take up to 4–6 weeks for FASENRA to be approved by your insurance.

You could pay as little as **(\$0)** for FASENRA with the FASENRA Savings Program. To be eligible, you must be commercially insured.\*

## ● How is FASENRA delivered?

Your doctor may have FASENRA in their office. If not, a Specialty Pharmacy will deliver FASENRA to your doctor's office or to your home if you are self-administering the FASENRA Pen. It is critical that you answer/return all phone calls from the Specialty Pharmacy in order for them to deliver FASENRA as quickly as possible.

If you have any questions about getting FASENRA delivered, contact your doctor's office.

## ● How do I start my treatment?

Starting FASENRA may be a little different than what you're used to. Your doctor will provide you with a FASENRA Welcome Kit that has helpful information and tips to get started. If your doctor doesn't have one, call the number below to request one.

If your doctor is administering FASENRA, you will need to schedule an appointment with your doctor. If you are self-administering the FASENRA Pen, your doctor will show you how to self-administer. Our team of nurses can provide additional self-administration training to you by phone, video, or during an in-home visit.

## ● Is there support for my treatment?

FASENRA 360 is a support program that provides different resources to help you get the most out of your treatment:

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

**Do not use FASENRA** if you are allergic to benralizumab or any of the ingredients in FASENRA. Do not use to treat sudden breathing problems.

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

### FASENRA may cause serious side effects, including:

- **allergic (hypersensitivity) reactions, including anaphylaxis.** Serious allergic reactions can happen after you get your FASENRA injection. Allergic reactions can sometimes happen hours or days after you get your injection. Tell your healthcare provider or get emergency help right away if you have any of the following symptoms of an allergic reaction:
  - swelling of your face, mouth and tongue
  - breathing problems
  - fainting, dizziness, feeling lightheaded (low blood pressure)
  - rash
  - hives

### Before using FASENRA, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- are taking oral or inhaled corticosteroid medicines. **Do not** stop taking your corticosteroid medicines unless instructed by your healthcare provider. This may cause other symptoms that were controlled by the corticosteroid medicine to come back.
- have a parasitic (helminth) infection.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if FASENRA will harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant during your treatment with FASENRA.
  - There is a pregnancy exposure registry that monitors pregnancy outcomes in women exposed to FASENRA during pregnancy. Healthcare providers can enroll patients or encourage patients to enroll themselves by calling 1-877-311-8972 or visiting [www.mothersbaby.org/fasenra](http://www.mothersbaby.org/fasenra).
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if FASENRA passes into your breast milk. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby if you use FASENRA.
- are taking prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, or herbal supplements.

**Do not** stop taking your other asthma medicines unless instructed to do so by your healthcare provider.

**The most common side effects of FASENRA include:** headache and sore throat. These are not all the possible side effects of FASENRA.

## APPROVED USE

FASENRA is a prescription medicine used with other asthma medicines for the maintenance treatment of asthma in people 12 years and older whose asthma is not controlled with their current asthma medicines. FASENRA helps prevent severe asthma attacks (exacerbations) and may improve your breathing. Medicines such as FASENRA reduce blood eosinophils. Eosinophils are a type of white blood cell that may contribute to your asthma.

FASENRA is not used to treat other problems caused by eosinophils and is not used to treat sudden breathing problems. Tell your healthcare provider if your asthma does not get better or if it gets worse after you start treatment with FASENRA.

It is not known if FASENRA is safe and effective in children under 12 years of age.

## FASENRA SAVINGS PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY AND TERMS OF USE

Patients must have commercial health insurance and a valid prescription for FASENRA. Patients who are enrolled in a state or federally funded prescription insurance program are not eligible for this offer. This includes patients enrolled in Medicare Part B, Medicare Part D, Medicaid, Medigap, Veterans Affairs (VA), Department of Defense (DoD) programs or TriCare, and patients who are Medicare eligible and enrolled in an employer-sponsored group waiver health plan or government-subsidized prescription drug benefit program for retirees. If a patient is enrolled in a state or federally funded prescription insurance program, they may not use this program even if they elect to be processed as an uninsured (cash-paying) patient. This offer is not insurance and is restricted to residents of the United States and Puerto Rico. Patients who are residents of Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, or Rhode Island are not eligible for injection administration assistance.
